Dr. James Bruce Murphy

Dr. Murphy died on Nov. 20, 2008, at the age of 55 in Halifax, NS. He had his beloved family by his side. Dr. Murphy was a member of the Dalhousie Medical School class of 1980 and was very proud of his Silver D Award, given for overall excellence in student leadership and contribution to student life at Dalhousie Medical School. He went on to complete a urology residency at Dalhousie, graduating in 1985. He then pursued a fellowship in male reproductive medicine, surgery and microsurgery at Baylor College of Medicine, Houston, Tex. With his wife, Lesley Gray, he moved to St. John's, NL, where he began his medical practice. With his growing family, Dr. Murphy moved to Port Williams, NS, where he practised at Valley Regional Hospital in Kentville, NS. A dedicated physician, Dr. Murphy was genuinely concerned about his patients. He was an even more devoted husband and father. He fostered in his children a love of books and animals. He worked hard to give them the best of everything. Dr. Murphy is survived by his wife and children.

Dr. Jean Massé

Dr. Massé died on Dec. 29, 2008, at the age of 71 in Sherbrooke, Que. He graduated from Université Laval, specializing in urology, in 1963.

Dr. John Hall Maus

Dr. Maus died on Nov. 1, 2008, at the age of 90, in Windsor, Ont. Dr. Maus graduated from the University of Toronto, specializing in radiation oncology, in 1942. After completing his medical degree, he used his skills to serve in World War II. Upon his return, he joined the Windsor Cancer Clinic in 1953 as the staff radiologist and surgeon. Ten years later, he was named the clinic director, a position he held for 20 years. During that time, the facility expanded significantly to accommodate the growing number of cancer patients in the region. Even after his retirement, his knowledge and expertise were still sought after. Dr. Maus was a former director of the Ontario Cancer Foundation Clinic (now the Windsor Regional Cancer Centre). He was involved in the local health care community even after he retired. His son Roger remembered him as a hard-working doctor, "tirelessly devoted" to his patients and their families. Dr. Maus and his wife, Shirley, who died in 1999, had 5 children (Roger, Elizabeth, Linda, Natalie, Peggy and Laurie). Dr. Maus was also a grandfather and a great-grandfather.

Dr. Karl Edward Matzinger

Dr. Matzinger died on Jan. 17, 2009, at the age of 88, in Ottawa, Ont. He graduated from Univerzita Komenskeho in Czechoslovakia in 1944, specializing in radiation oncology. He died peacefully at the Ottawa Civic Hospital after an acute stroke. He was a radiologist at the old Ottawa General Hospital and at the Pembroke General Hospital. He loved summers at the cottage, reading, listening to music, growing roses, feeding the birds and spending time with his family. He will be missed and remembered by all. Dr. Matzinger was the loving husband of Lucy (nee Dylowna). He was a devoted father to Dr. Mary Ann Matzinger (Dr. Dan Cameron), Dr. Fred Matzinger (Jocelyne, nee Brault), and Dr. Jane Matzinger; and grandfather to Catherine, Richard, Paul, Elizabeth and Alexandra.
