Dr. Martin Resnick

Dr. Resnick died on June 24, 2007, at the age of 64, owing to complications of acute myeloid leukemia. Dr. Resnick chaired Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine's urology department and several national urology associations. During his career, Dr. Resnick headed the American Urological Association, American Board of Urology and Society of University Urologists. He earned numerous honors for his dedication to raising the status of the field of urology in the medical world and to the public. He received the American Urological Association's Gold Cystoscope Award in 1985 and its Distinguished Past Scholar Award. He also received the Socit Internationale d'Urologie's Distinguished Career Award and the American Association of Genitourinary Surgeons' Spence Medal for 2007. Dr. Resnick was the founding editor of *Contemporary Urology*. He told his family that being named editor of the Journal of Urology, a post he held at the time of his death, was the pinnacle of his career.

Dr. George Elmer Bonnell

Dr. Bonnell died on July 26, 2007, at the age of 89, at his home in Fredericton, NB. During World War II, he served overseas from 1939 to 1945 in England, Italy and France and took part in the Liberation of the Netherlands. He served with the Royal Canadian Artillery and was awarded the 1939–1945 Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Defence Medal, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, War Medal 1939–1945 and was twice Mentioned in *Dispatches* for bravery. Upon return from the war, he upgraded his education at Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown. He was subsequently accepted to and graduated from Dalhousie Medical School in 1953. He then furthered his training at McGill University, earning his surgical fellowship in Urology in 1960. During his urological training he was involved, as an assisting doctor, in the first kidney transplant ever performed in the British Empire. Dr. Bonnell set up his practice in urology in Fredericton, becoming Fredericton's first urologist. He was Chief of Surgery at the Dr. Everett Chalmers Hospital. In 1992, he received the commemorative medal for the 125th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada in recognition of his service to his community and to his country. Dr. Bonnell was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion. He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Dr. Mary Calder, and 5 children.
